If you already have a headset for airplanes, you can buy an adapter, do not buy the cheapest one, they have been known to fail*

 - *This isn't required and paper sectionals will suffice. It just gives additional situational awareness and consolidates all documents in one location. It can also be a backup for our paper logbook.*
